For example, if you want to buy a video game, is one store selling the game cheaper than another store? If you want to buy new headphones, does one brand of headphones offer the same features for less money than another brand? Doing a little extra research before you buy can save you money!

# Did you know there are three things kids can do with money?

That's right! They can Save it, Spend it, or Share it! What do each of those words mean? Save means to put money aside for later, **spend** means to buy something now, and **share** means to give money to a cause you care about.

#### **Did You Know?**

Certain bills use special security features to make it harder for criminals to make fake ones. Try this! Hold a \$5 bill up to light and turn it slightly at an angle. Do you see a large "5" appear in the blank space to the right of Lincoln's face? That's called a "watermark," and it's just one way banks check to make sure money is real. Pretty cool!



## Let's go to the movies!

Let's learn how to budget by pretending to go to the movies! Before the show starts, you have \$5 to spend on snacks. How would you spend it?



Dollars aren't printed on regular paper! They are made of a special material that's mostly cotton and linen. Cotton is the same material that many of your clothes are made from. We call dollars "paper," but they are really more like fabric.



All the words and pictures that appear on the dollar are engraved on metal plates and \* painted with a special ink. The plates are then pressed onto the cotton material, just like a stamp!






Using a high-speed printing press, more than 8,000 sheets of money can be printed per hour! That's a lot of bills!
